Douglas County, Kan., says she won't prosecute anyone after 'bathroom bill' goes into effect

DOUGLAS COUNTY, Kan. — Douglas County District Attorney Suzanne Valdez said Friday that her office will not prosecute any case under Kansas Senate Bill 180.

The bill, referred to as the "women's bill of rights" by supporters and "the bathroom bill" by opponents, will go into law next month after legislators were able to override Gov. Laura Kelly's veto during the legislative calendar.

The Kansas bill defines male and female based on a person's physical anatomy at birth and prohibits transgender people from using restrooms and locker rooms.

"As District Attorney, I was deeply saddened when this law was passed," Valdez said in a statement. "In today's chaotic world where we should treat one another with dignity, understanding and compassion, the Kansas legislature chose to create a law that is senseless and, quite frankly, potentially dangerous to our trans community."

She said her office will "continue to focus our efforts on ensuring public safety by prosecuting crimes committed against children, sexual assault matters, gun violence and all other violent

crime," according to a statement provided.
